### SALUTE

At the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico, US track athletes Tommie Smith and John Carlos raised their fists in a controversial "black power" salute during the national anthem. Beside them on the podium, wearing a human rights badge, was Aussie Peter Norman, who was later reprimanded and alienated for his support of their cause. This doco is a compelling slice of Australian history.

### THE DARK KNIGHT

Intense, feverish and brooding, this is possibly the greatest superhero film in the genre to date. Elegantly crafted and searing with emotion, it's closer to the *Batman* comic books than anything prior. High expectations have been placed on Heath Ledger as The Joker; but he does deliver – the film is driven by his pitch-perfect lunatic menace, and he is much more snivelling than Jack Nicholson's 1989 version. Edge-of-your-seat excitement.

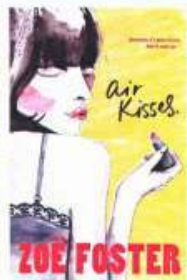


### HED KANDI: DISCO HEAVEN

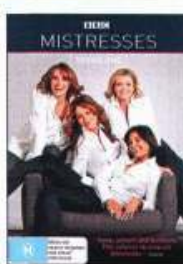


### AIR KISSES

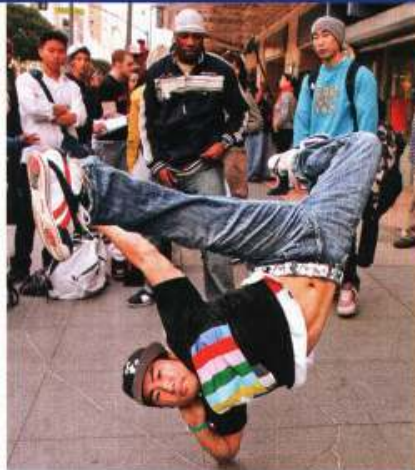

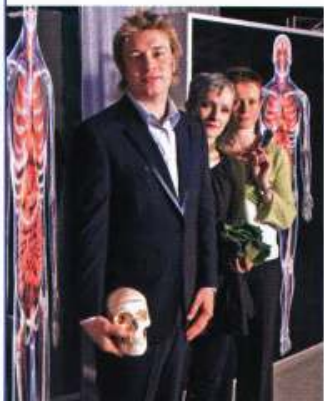
### SO YOU THINK YOU CAN DANCE - US
